 The McKinney-Vento Act: The McKinney-Vento Federal Homeless Assistance Act is the primary legislation that defines the educational rights of children and youth who lack permanent housing. Students are eligible if: they lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence are "doubled-up" or living with friends or relatives due to economic hardship, loss of housing or similar reason live in a shelter, transitional housing, motel, hotel, vehicle or campground are unaccompanied youth or runaway youth McKinney-Vento Student Entitlements: Per the McKinney- Vento Homeless Assistance Act, eligible students and their families are entitled to: transportation, mental health support, backpacks, school supplies, food and clothing, immediate school enrollment, and supplemental educational support.
